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PORSCHE 911 (992) GT3 TOURING

Essentially a 911 GT3 without the huge rear wing, the first edition 991 GT3 Touring arrived as recently as 2017, a response to the limited edition 911 R released a year earlier, which caused such a stir. This is the latest 992 generation car, featuring a naturally aspirated 4.0-litre engine, which has a lot in common with the one found in Porsche's GT3 Cup racing car. Power output is 503bhp and top speed 198mph.

PORSCHE 959, 1988

The 959 was a startling demonstration of Porsche engineering. Based on the 911, it featured electronically adjustable suspension and four-wheel drive, with computers governing the torque sent to each axle. Produced during the Supercar boom of the late 1980s, all 200 were snapped up in no time, often changing hands at well over list price. Although unquestionably a masterpiece of technical sophistication, the 959 somehow lacked the glamour of its Italian contemporaries, most notably represented by the Ferrari F40.

ASTON MARTIN V12 VANTAGE COUPÉ

Former Aston Martin boss Tobias Moers, the man who oversaw the development of this final V12 Vantage, describes the new 200mph super coupé as "the fastest, most powerful and most dynamically capable V12 Vantage ever" and "an embodiment of Aston Martin's intensifying focus on driving dynamics, which ensures it will go out on the highest of highs". Production is limited to 333 examples, all pre-sold.

ASTON MARTIN V8 VANTAGE LE MANS V600, 1999

The V8 Vantage Le Mans V600 was a remarkable blend of luxury and brutish power. Limited to 40 examples, its exclusivity added to its appeal. The rearwheel drive V600 was powered by a monstrous, handbuilt 5.3-litre V8 engine producing 600bhp. This unsurprisingly created some impressive performance figures, with a 0-60mph time of just 3.9 seconds and a top speed of 200mph. The Le Mans V600 also featured an opulent interior and had distinctive bodywork, with various aerodynamic enhancements to aid stability.

LAMBORGHINI HURACÁN TECNICA

The outrageously styled Huracán Tecnica blends Italian passion and state-of-the-art technology within an aluminium and carbonfibre body. Magneto-rheologic suspension contains magnetically controlled fluid which changes the damper response, while electronically controlled rear-wheel drive targets power for precise control. The Tecnica's 5,204cc 40-valve V10 develops 630bhp, a sub-3 second 0-60mph time and a top speed of 202mph.

LAMBORGHINI URRACO 3000, 1976

The Bertone-styled Urraco (the name meaning 'little bull') was announced in 1970, with deliveries commencing in 1972. It was a relatively small Lamborghini, intended to compete with rivals such as Ferrari's Dino 308 and Porsche's 911 in an important market sector. The Urraco adopted the Miura's basic mechanical layout, but in place of the Miura's transversely mounted 4.0-litre V12 there was a 2.5-litre V8, which, despite its simpler specification, still produced a highly respectable 220bhp at 7,500rpm.

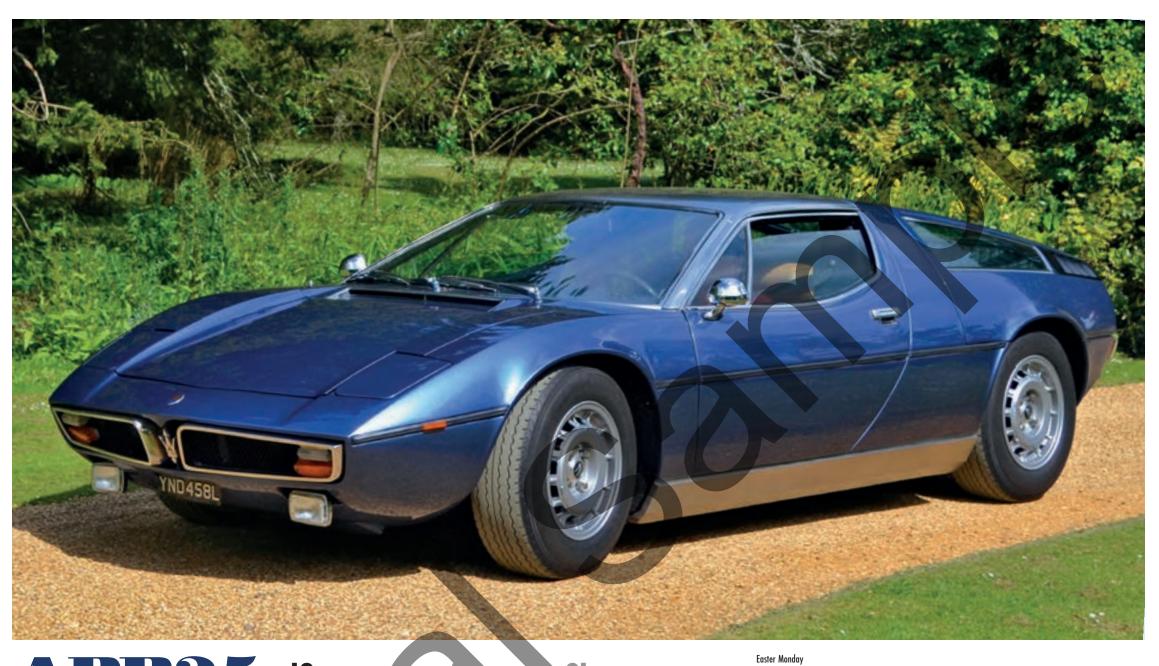

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MASERATI GRANTURISMO TROFEO

Maserati GT models of recent years have tended to be stylish but understated and the elegant GranTurismo Trofeo continues this trend. Unlike several of its GT competitors, the Trofeo is a genuine four-seater with an extremely comfortable and luxuriously appointed interior. Performance is also outstanding — the Trofeo's race-derived 542bhp V6 Nettuno Twin Turbo engine also powers their current MC20 Supercar.

MASERATI BORA, 1972

The elegant, Giugiaro-designed Bora was Maserati's first mid-engined car and their answer to Lamborghini's legendary Miura. The Bora was powered by a 4.7-litre V8 engine producing 310bhp and had a similar 170mph top speed to the Miura. However, the Maserati took a clear lead in terms of overall package by virtue of its unrivalled levels of luxury and comfort, with a 5-speed ZF manual gearbox, advanced suspension and a spacious, well-equipped cabin which included the world's first adjustable pedals.

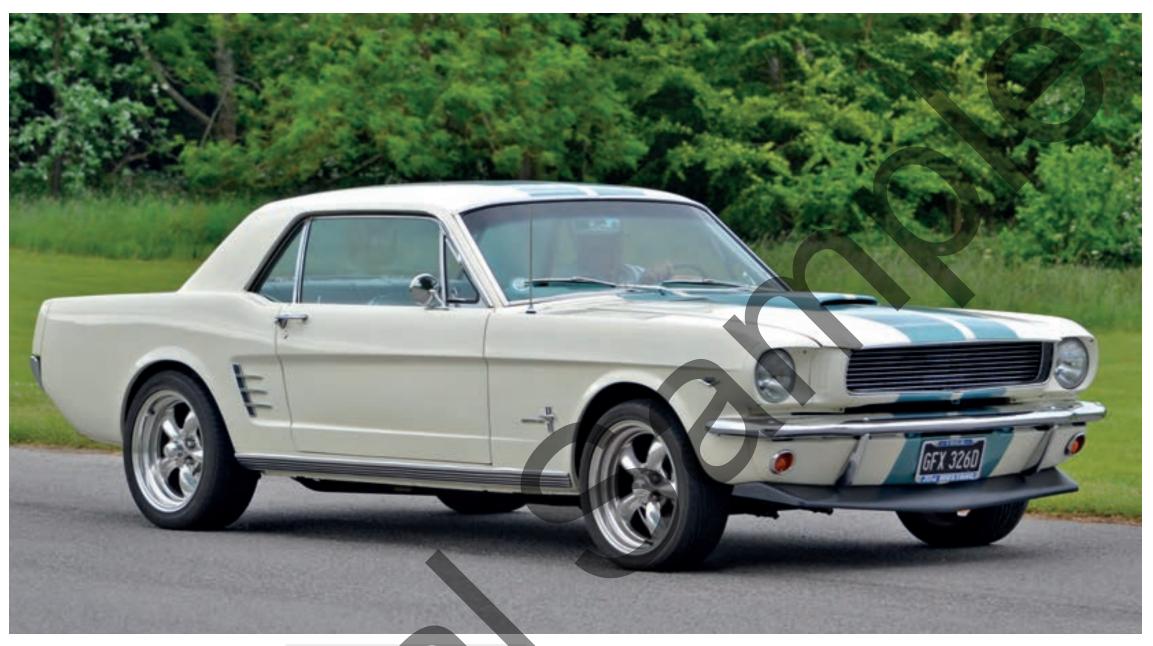

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FORD MUSTANG SM17

The Mustang Scott McLaughlin Limited Edition pays homage to the Kiwi racing legend's achievements.

Powered by a 5.0-litre V8 engine, producing 480 horsepower and 420lb-ft of torque, it boasts a powerfully aggressive stance and remarkable performance, with a 0-60mph sprint time of just 4 seconds. The handling benefits from performance-tuned suspension, while unique wheels and graphics enhance the looks.

FORD MUSTANG, 1966

Based on the humble Falcon saloon, the Mustang was introduced in 1964 and was initially available in notchback form only, as shown here. 1965 saw the addition of the popular fastback body style and introduced a wider range of engines, from the basic 2.8-litre straight-6 all the way up to a 4.8-litre (or 289ci) Windsor HiPo V8 making 306bhp, and enabling a 0-60mph time of 6.5 seconds. Ford only expected to sell around 100,000 Mustangs in their first year but it took just 18 months to pass the million mark.

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FERRARI F8 SPIDER

It used to be said that buying a convertible meant putting up with compromises such as scuttle shake, considerable extra weight and a drop in performance, but that really is not the case with the exhilarating F8 Spider. The retractable hardtop roof adds drama and versatility without compromising the car's structural integrity, preserving the coupé-like aesthetics whilst enabling the full open-air experience.

FERRARI 328 GTS, 1989

Ten years after Ferrari launched the 308 GTB at the Paris Show, the company gave the model a facelift and performance boost in the shape of the 328 GTB and 328 GTS. The two-seat, mid-engine Coupé and Targa also received minor exterior revisions that softened the angularity of the 308. In particular, the grille was brought forward to flatten the car's nose and the bumpers became body-coloured, but the 328 retained the distinctive side ducts and covered headlights that helped to make the 308 a true icon.

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JAGUAR F-TYPE P380 V6 R-DYNAMIC

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The sleek bonnet of the facelifted F-Type conceals a potent and raucous 3.0-litre supercharged V6 engine, churning out 380bhp and 339lb-ft of torque. Paired with an 8-speed automatic transmission, it rockets from 0-60mph in just 4.9 seconds and enables a top speed of around 170mph. The R-Dynamic package enhances agility with tuned suspension and sharper steering, while the interior exudes luxury.

JAGUAR XJ220, 1994

The XJ220 was the product of 'The Saturday Club', a group of Jaguar engineers led by Jim Randle. They dreamt up the idea of a 220mph supercar, working on the concept in their spare time. Jaguar soon took the idea on board to showcase their commitment to pushing boundaries and the prototype was shown at the 1988 NEC Motor Show. The maximum speed recorded by the 542bhp XJ220 was 217mph, so not quite the full 220, but sufficiently rapid to make it the world's fastest production car from 1992 to 1994.

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BUGATTI CHIRON SUPER SPORT 300+

The Chiron Super Sport 300+ produces a scarcely believable 1,600 horsepower from its 8.0-litre, quadturbocharged W16 engine, accelerating from 0-60mph in a mere 2.3 seconds and hitting an electronically limited top speed of 304mph, setting a new benchmark for hypercars. Limited to just 30 units, the Chiron Super Sport 300+ is a testament to Bugatti's relentless pursuit of automotive excellence.

BUGATTI TYPE 57C STELVIO CABRIOLET, 1938

The Type 57 was produced from March 1934 until the outbreak of WWII, with a total of over 700 built. Heavily influenced by Ettore Bugatti's talented young son, Jean, the car was larger and far more refined than all the company's previous base models and was new in almost every respect. Three complete body styles were produced at the factory from 1934, all named after famous Alpine peaks, together with a chassis-only version which enabled the leading coachbuilders of the day to exercise their individual skills.

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BMW's 440i offers a perfect fusion of style and performance. The coupé's sleek design is complemented by a modern tech-filled interior, while adaptive suspension options ensure a balance between comfort and sportiness. At its heart is a 3.0-litre turbocharged inline-6 engine, delivering 320bhp and 330lb-ft of torque. Paired with an 8-speed automatic transmission, it sprints from 0-60mph in just 4.6 seconds.

BMW M1, 1980

BMW only built 453 of the striking Giugiaro-designed M1 cars, pooling talent from Lamborghini for suspension, Italdesign for the body and Bauer for mechanical components before final assembly by BMW Motorsport, with 54 cars destined for the racetrack. The M1 was the first BMW to carry the famous M badge and was powered by a mid-mounted, fuel-injected, 3.5-litre engine producing 277bhp and a top speed of 165mph.

NISSAN 400Z

The 400Z represents a thrilling blend of heritage and modern performance, with an exterior clearly inspired by the iconic Z cars of the past and an interior loaded with advanced tech. Powered by a 3.0-litre twin-turbocharged V6 engine, it delivers 400bhp and 350lb-ft of torque to the rear wheels. The car's dynamic handling is further enhanced by adaptive suspension, ensuring precise control on the road.

DATSUN 240Z, 1972

The Datsun 240Z is an iconic sports car celebrated for its distinctive blend of style and performance. Powered by a 2.4-litre inline-6 engine generating 151bhp it delivered thrilling acceleration and a dynamic driving experience. The rear-wheel-drive setup, coupled with a 4-speed manual transmission, enabled a 0-60mph sprint in 8 seconds. The 240Z's sleek appearance and timeless design, characterised by its long bonnet and elegant fastback profile, contributes to its enduring appeal among enthusiasts.

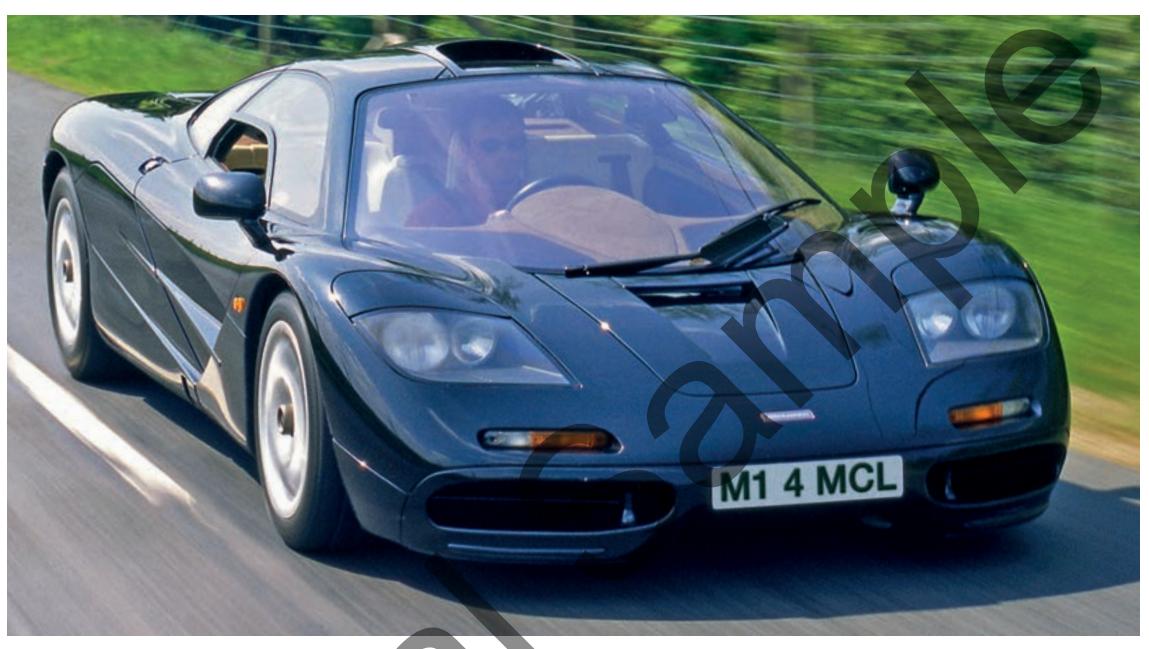

MCLAREN MSOO01

The McLaren Special Operations (MSO) branch epitomises automotive exclusivity and customisation. Established by McLaren to cater for discerning clients' desires, MSO crafts bespoke, limited-run, one-of-a-kind vehicles, usually based on their own production supercars. Here, a completely unique one-off car has been created based on the 765LT Spider, an already special, carbon fibre bodied, midengined supercar.

MCLAREN F1, 1994

The McLaren F1 was a money-no-object attempt to build the ultimate Supercar, a road car as close to the performance and technology of a Formula One car as contemporary science and engineering could make it. Designed by Gordon Murray and utilising a 6,064cc, V12 BMW engine, the result was the first million-dollar car and the fastest production car in the world, with a maximum speed of just over 240mph. The three-seater layout, with the driver's seat centred, further enhanced the driving experience.

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LOTUS EXIGE CUP 430

The lightweight mid-engined Exige, launched over 20 years ago, has proved immensely popular as a fast and characterful road car. It comes to life on the racetrack where its superb handling characteristics can be fully exploited. Using a development of the 3.5-litre V6 from the Lotus Evora GT430, the Exige Cup 430 makes 430bhp at 7,000rpm, sprints to 60mph in 3.2 seconds and has a top speed of 180mph.

LOTUS ESPRIT TURBO, 1986

The first James Bond car not to wear Aston Martin badges, the Esprit enjoyed a production run of over 25 years and became one of the company's most successful models. The striking, wedge-shaped profile of the mid-engined Esprit S1 was the work of Giorgetto Giugiaro back in 1976, and although softened slightly for the S3 in 1981, that profile remained virtually unchanged until in-house designer Peter Stephens' makeover in 1987, the facelifted look lasting until Esprit production ended in 2004.
